Drugs found in 31 bags hidden in van at Cozad

COZAD—A Fresno, CA, man, Cesar Aguirre, was arrested in Cozad recently on charges of possession of cocaine. The arrest was made after two passengers, who had been riding with Aguirre before being left near Ogallala, notified authorities. Aguirre exited I-80 at Cozad and a state patrolman followed his van into a motel parking lot. A search resulted in the seizure of about 10 pounds of cocaine found in 31 bags hidden in the van's fenders. Aguirre was being held at the Dawson County Law Enforcement Center in Lexington.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.
