Cozad grad earns top junior shooter champ

COZAD—Cozad High School graduate Courtney Anthony was awarded the Majesty trophy and walked away with plenty of hardware from the 2010 United States National Rifle and Pistol Championships held at Fort Benning's range complex. Anthony was first overall in the 10-meter air pistol junior women competition with a score of 739 and was third overall in the women's open division.
