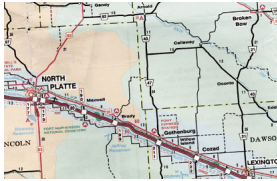

NDEQ orders upgrade to wastewater plant

COZAD—The Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality has issued an Administrative Order for the City of Cozad to upgrade its wastewater treatment plant. State officials said that the estimated \$2,020,000 project is necessary because in the past four years, the city has “received excess organic and dry cleaning product loading from two industries,” at the treatment site. The city has consistently violated the ammonia; CBOD, suspended solids and fecal coliform parameters of the NPDES permit limitations, according to DEQ officials. The order directs Cozad to have the proposed plant update completed before Oct. 1, 2012.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.
