Former Cozad schools secretary sentenced

COZAD—Former Cozad School District No. 11 secretary, Brenda Sigler, was sentenced to 7-12 years in prison at the Nebraska Correctional Center for Women in York. Dawson County District Court Judge James Doyle imposed the sentence and also ordered that she make restitution of \$325,000 to the Cozad schools. Sigler had pled guilty to three counts of theft and four counts of forgery on allegations she fraudulently and improperly diverted to herself and for her benefit the funds taken from school activity accounts.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.

Grocery Kart to add deli, other improvements

BROKEN BOW—The locally-owned Grocery Kart in Broken Bow is about to get bigger. They've purchased the land next door, cleared off an old building and placed the order. Come fall, they will connect 6,500 square feet of retail space directly to the west of the current building and expand. The expansion will also add a full-service deli and other improvements to better meet the needs of its customers. Plans are to have the building up and enclosed before the snow flies.—reported in the Custer County Chief.
