CPNRD in historic plan to buy Six Mile Canal

COZAD—The Central Platte Natural Resources District (CPNRD) is in the final stages of leading an historic effort to buy out a Six Mile irrigation canal along the Platte River in Central Nebraska. The CPNRD partnered with nearly 30 landowners to complete an ongoing effort to close and fill the irrigation canal—that was built in 1894—as an effort to increase Platte River flows and return water to the river which helps protect endangered species, makes irrigation more efficient and puts more land into crop production as well as improving public safety.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.

Triple fatality accident under investigation

BROKEN BOW—The Nebraska State Patrol and Custer County Sheriff's Office investigated a triple fatality traffic crash that occurred Dec. 18 two miles west of Ansley. A westbound Chevy Avalanche, driven by a 44-year-old male of Elkhorn, crossed the center line and was struck in the eastbound lane by a Kenworth tractor-trailer combination, driven by a Broken Bow man. Killed in the crash were the Elkhorn father and his two daughters, ages 10 and 12. The accident remains under investigation as weather was not believed to have been a contributing factor.—reported in the Custer County Chief.
