BROKEN BOW—Meant to be a final goodbye—a celebration of the lives of two special men who impacted a school and a community—mission accomplished. It was standing room only recently as hundreds of students, parents, alumni, friends, family and community members packed into the Broken Bow Municipal Auditorium for a final tribute to Coach Zane Harvey and Coach Anthony Blum, killed in a June 1 traffic accident near Ansley. It was a positive celebration service with stories and memories being shared. A memorial cross was also constructed on State Highway 2 as a tribute to those who died in the accident and also as a reminder to drive safe. The public is invited to sign the cross. Other recent tributes have included decorating the lawns of both coaches' homes with flowers, signs and mementos, and bracelets were made, ribbons hung, stories told and tears and laughter shared.—reported in the Custer County Chief.

After two years, he moved to Eustis where he has lived and worked for the last 48 years along with teaching English and physical education during his tenure. He also served as athletic director at Eustis-Farnam for 27 years. Pierce says it's not about him, it's about the kids, and it's the kids that are the stars. He now plans to kick back, spend a lot of time with family and go on trips. Advice for the next coach includes having compassion for kids and treating them fairly.—reported in the Frontier County Enterprise.
