

Relay For Life earns \$88,000 for cancer fight

Reading more than 700 names broke the solemn silence during the 15th Annual American Cancer Society Relay For Life luminaria ceremony at Cozad High School on Aug. 18.

Relay committee members, team captains and team members gathered to put the finishing touches on the 2009 relay event that was rained out in July.

Richard Johnson of Lexington read the names honoring cancer survivors and remembering those lost to cancer as those attending silently followed each name displayed on a screen.

To conclude the event, everyone walked a symbolic lap around the cafeteria to signify the end of this year's relay and the beginning of the continued fight to find a cure for cancer.

"Our Relay For Life is a testament to what each of us as individuals can do when we work together," said Coleen Favinger. "We get together and make things happen in Dawson County." Favinger and Deb Tvrdy, both of Cozad, co-chaired the event.

The Spirit Award for 2009 went to Chris Barnes of Cozad. This special recognition is the result of an open vote among team captains and committee members to recognize the person who demonstrates the relay spirit and a continued determination to fight cancer.

Barnes is a two-time cancer survivor and has been an active team member and team captain, as well as serving on the committee for several years. This year, she and her husband, Lynn, were survivor committee co-chairs organizing survivor invitations, registrations and activities.

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The top two Miss Relay contestants who delivered their dripping dollar bills to the finance trailer after the downpour during the relay event were recognized with certificates and gifts.

Winning the title of Miss Relay 2009 was Aaron Hueftle of Eustis with a total of \$167.06 for the Rolling Meadows 4-H Club A team. A very close runner up was Shawn Lux of Lexington with a total of \$166 for the To-Ti-Ella team.

The evening's meeting also celebrated successful fundraising efforts. Finance chairperson Julie McNett reported a grand total of \$88,138.91 raised by Relay teams and corporate sponsor donations. The total included a record-breaking on-line fundraising total of \$4,750.

The top fundraising team with \$7,974.44 was Women's Cancer Support Group Garden of Hope 1. Team captain Pam Ackerman of Lexington was named top individual fundraiser with \$2,325.40.

The Garden of Hope 2 team raised \$3,380.50 bringing the combined total for the support group up to \$11,354.94.

The top five fundraising teams also included Plum Creek Medical Group, \$6,000; The "Block" Party, \$5,077.24; Cozad FCCLA, \$4,377.70; and Cozad State Bank Care-N For the One You Love, \$4,157.84.



The top youth fundraising team was Cozad FCCLA with team member Brooke Banzhaf being the top youth individual fundraiser with \$430. Rolling Meadows 4-H Club A from Eustis raised \$1,708.15 and the Cool Kids of Cozad raised \$605.
