Ogallala burglary nets thief \$60,000 in jewelry

OGALLALA—An estimated \$60,000 in jewelry was stolen during an early morning burglary Sunday, Dec. 6, at Reichert's Jewelry at Ogallala. According to Ogallala Police Department officials, an automatic alarm signaled a burglary in progress at 3:47 a.m. in the jewelry store located on Spruce Street. The thief or thieves entered by breaking the glass of the store's front

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door. After officers arrived on the scene and covered both the front and back entrances, they found the burglar to already be gone. Several glass display cases were smashed where the jewelry was taken. The investigation is ongoing and police officials have no current suspects but are retrieving security cameras from the area.—taken from the Keith County News.
