School partially locked among possible threat

ARNOLD—Principal Dawn Lewis set a partial lock-down of the school in motion on Sept. 10, when two students told her they had seen a man at the local convenience store with guns and ammunition on him. A partial lock-down involved the parameter doors being locked, but classrooms remained open. After contact with the local police department, Lewis received word that the man was non-threatening, and that he was staying in town with a friend. He was just expressing his second amendment rights and held a permit. Members of the school board and the superintendent praised Lewis in handling the situation, “She did the right thing and didn’t overreact.” The incident was calmly handled instead of getting out of control.—reported in the Arnold Sentinel.
