### Maywood FFA goes to state area land judging

**CURTIS**—About 240 students from 12 schools in Southwest Nebraska competed in the 2013 Southwest Area Land Judging Contest held in McCook on Oct. 2. High school FFA students were tested on their knowledge of soil, its texture and permeability, land use and land capability. The top finisher was Chaten Edgren from Holdrege High School, scoring 326, receiving a purple ribbon. The top team was also from Holdrege with a score of 864 out of a possible 1200, followed by Arapahoe and Franklin. The Maywood FFA team will be moving on to state competition.—reported in the Frontier County Enterprise.

### Human remains found southeast of Arnold

**ARNOLD**—Blake Bierman of rural Arnold was parking a truck in a silage bunker, located southeast of town, when he noticed a bone sticking out of the bank. After digging, he found it to be human and contacted the Custer County Sheriff’s office, who then contacted the Nebraska State Patrol and State Historical Society. After a forensic dig, a smoking pipe and box with artifacts were located near the remains, which was under 24-hour surveillance during the two-day process. It was determined that the remains are of a male Native American and that the site was a grave. The anthropologist will try to determine what tribe he was from and notify that tribe. Bierman attributes the cattle and rain erosion to exposing the long-buried remains.—reported in the Arnold Sentinel.

authorize the district to go ahead with the pilot program that will likely encompass grades 9-12 next year. The senior class will be issued machines already in the school's inventory and protective cases will be purchased for them. Decisions were based on the fact that technology is changing how students research and receive information as well as curriculum and how it is taught. Of 44 districts in ESU 10, 36 have either already implemented programs to join the 1:1 Mobile Learning Initiative or are planning to do so.—reported in the Callaway Courier.
