BROKEN BOW—An Arcadia cowgirl June Holeman was the belle of the ball at the AT&T Stadium recently earning the right to run for the money. At 70 years old, Holeman received a standing ovation at the RFD American Rodeo and proved she could ride with the best barrel racers placing sixth. With a 14.285 ride, she was less than 1/100th of a second out of fourth place and a spot in the Shoot Out in barrel racing. She didn't go home empty handed, as Polaris, sponsor of the American Rodeo, announced it would present her "A true American cowgirl" with one of their vehicles. Moisture totaled more than twice average

OGALLALA—While Kingsley Dam officials recorded more than 10 inches of snow during February, which more than doubled the 30-year expected average for precipitation, it was the cold that residents will most remember from the past month. On 16 of 28 days in February, the nighttime low was in the single digits or below zero. The lowest low was minus 13 degrees on Feb. 5. Snow also was a major factor during the past month for the area with 11 days of measurable precipitation with Kingsley Dam officials measuring 1.11 inches of moisture, .62 of an inch more than the 30-year expected average.—reported in the Keith County News.

Curtis/Maywood EMTs honored for service

CURTIS—Members of the Frontier County EMTs of Curtis and Maywood were recently honored at a supper meeting. Board members presented each EMT with a small token for their dedication for service they provide to the community. Groundwater levels fall; long-term trend up

ARNOLD—As was the case in most of the state, groundwater levels in the Lower Loup Natural Resources District (LLNRD) have fallen following the record drought of 2013. In the LLNRD, levels dropped an average of 2.58 feet. In Custer County, that average decline was slightly less, at 2.3 feet. According to NRD general manager Leon “Butch” Koehlmoos, data comes from annual monitoring of groundwater levels, and the decline in 2013 is notable when looked at in a narrow one-year view. However, when data accumulated over four decades is reviewed, the 2013 decline is just one of many peaks and valleys of the levels in the basin.—reported in the Arnold Sentinel.

Speech team third at LVC with accolades

CALLAWAY—Members of the Callaway speech team traveled to Loup County Schools recently for the Loup Valley Conference Speech Tournament.
