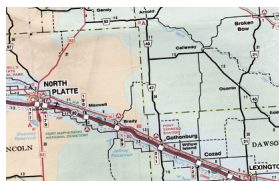

School creates program to certify students

COZAD—In an effort to meet student needs not being met in the traditional academic way at Cozad Schools, community and school officials have teamed up to create a program that helps students gain certifications for experiences and to make them more viable in the work market once graduated. One such certification program being offered is in the medical field. Eleven students have enrolled in the class which offers the Certified Nurses Assistant program. Community members and professionals are helping to supply funding and supplies for the program.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.

Self defense course draws record number

ARNOLD—Word had gotten around on what was taking place in Arnold recently as women and girls from several area communities took advantage of a free self defense course presented by Shawn Hebbert, Grant County Sheriff, and Wynn Weins, Deputy County Sheriff from Hooker County. Sixty-five women signed up for the class at the school gym to learn techniques that would give them the upper hand if they are ever attacked. The officers stated they had never had a class that large all at once and drew girls as young as seventh grade and women nearing age 60.—reported in the Arnold Sentinel.

Student-issued laptops one more step closer

CALLAWAY—It’s not a question if Callaway Public Schools will issue notebook or laptop computers to its junior and senior high students, it’s more like when. School tech guru Bob Keeney had stated in a previous meeting of the Board of Education that simply issuing computers to students was not enough. There has to be a system in place to integrate students, teachers and curriculum within both the classroom and without for shared goals and management. The missing piece of the puzzle has now become available, a software plan called Schoology. The program would be at the base of issuing 85 students new notebook computers.—reported in the Callaway Courier.
