When Swede volleyball coach Becky Costello says it took a total team effort for her girls to defeat Broken Bow at home Thursday night, she's not kidding.

The momentum swayed from one side of the net to the other several times throughout the match, a sign of two evenly matched teams, Costello said.

"We just need to relax, eliminate errors and play the game," the coach said.

In the first set, Gothenburg came out roaring, communicating well and attacking the ball.

Costello said she felt like the girls relaxed a little too much in the second set which caused more missed serves and a few hitting errors.

"Once we got behind, we struggled," she said.

Gothenburg came back full force in the third set with more aggressive play.

"I think Joslyn (Oliver) was really warmed up by the third set," Costello said. "She played very well and that led to others stepping up."

The Swedes didn't have a single hitting error in the third set and at the same time put down six ace serves.

"We were on a roll but in the fourth set we had a few errors that allowed Broken Bow to get up on us," Costello said. "Then we had to play from behind."

The Indians pushed to a 9-4 advantage in the final set and it looked like Broken Bow might cruise to a win. Costello called a timeout.
