

Gothenburg ends post-season run with C1-6 loss to Kimball

After a turbulent ride through the regular season, Gothenburg's boys basketball team put together its best performances of the year during post season action.

It was a good time to peak, said coach Roger Koehler, providing some excitement for a team that saw its share of ups and downs.

Although nerves were visible in the first couple of minutes of the opening round of the C1-11 sub-district at Lexington last week, the Swedes settled down for a 50-40 victory over Chase County.

Then two nights later, Gothenburg took a focused attitude into the sub-district final.

The Swedes played what Koehler believes to be their most complete game of the year against Cozad, in a game that came down to free throws in the final minute.

Gothenburg beat the Haymakers 52-49 to advance to the C1-6 district final Monday night in Grant.

"We were one of 12 teams in Class C-1 still playing," Koehler said. "The kids battled hard. They went out with 100% effort."

But district opponent Kimball, with a shiny 19-1 record coming in, went 8-of-10 from the line in the last minute and a half of the game to pull out a 51-40 victory and advance to the state tournament next week.

Gothenburg ended the season 9-14.

"It's not the way we wanted it to end," the coach said, "but these kids have nothing to hang their heads about. They were definitely playing their best ball at the end of the year. As a coach, that's the way you want it."

Swede size causes

trouble for Longhorns




Gothenburg seemed a little tentative in the first round of the C1-11 sub-district on Feb. 19 but the nerves wore off midway through the first quarter.

"We didn't take care of the ball on two of the first four trips down the floor," Koehler said.

After allowing the Longhorns a 5-2 advantage in the first four minutes of the game, Gothenburg turned the tables.

The Swedes finished the first half shooting 77% from the field and they were 63% for the game.

After trailing 13-12 at the end of the first period, Gothenburg pulled ahead of Cozad 26-22 at halftime, scoring the last eight points of the second quarter.

"I think that set the tone going into the second half," Koehler said.

Then the Swedes extended a 1-3-1 zone defense in the second half with the long arms of Aaron Collins, Tanner Borchardt and Logan Koehler across the middle.

"I don't think Cozad expected that," the coach said. "Those three kids combined have an extremely long wing span."

But Cozad didn't go away, hitting a handful of key three-pointers in the second half to keep it interesting.

Up 48-46 with 20 seconds to play, Logan Koehler was fouled and sank a pair of free throws to extend the lead to four points.

A long three-pointer by Cozad's Jacob Rush on the next possession closed the gap with 6.5 seconds left until the Haymakers sent Koehler to the line again.

The senior made both attempts, despite a Cozad timeout in between in an attempt to ice him.



Borchardt was the leading scorer for Gothenburg with 17 points while Koehler managed a

"We knew Kimball wanted to play a fast-paced game," Koehler said. "We fell into their style in the first half and we knew we needed to control the tempo to start the third quarter."

Gothenburg managed to slow things down, the coach said, maybe a little too much.

Logan Koehler hit a shot at the 6:30 mark of the third period and the Swedes didn't score again until he banked another one with just over a minute to go in the quarter.

"We saw a little of the things that plagued us all season," the coach said. "Those mental lapses will kill you."

Down 37-27 to start the fourth quarter, Gothenburg couldn't chip into that lead much and was forced to foul to stop the clock in the final two minutes.

Koehler was high scorer in his last high school game with 17 points. He also had 11 rebounds and five assists.

Borchardt contributed 10 points and 12 rebounds.

"The kids never gave up," the coach said. "I even told them that a lot of lesser men would have given up on the season when our record was 6-11. It's a life lesson. That's what it's really all about.
