The nine-game winning streak that followed included a season highlight win over perennial powerhouse Minden in the Southwest Conference tournament.

Nothing came easy, though. Lecher credits his girls for their hard work and perseverance.

“And we had good leaders who each brought something special to the team,” he said.

Three seniors led the way. Once Taylor Wolf recovered from an injury she suffered during softball season, she became a force on the court both offensively and defensively.

“You could always count on Taylor to be in there fighting for the ball,” Lecher said.

Jacey Wiggins found a new comfort zone as a senior, learning that her height allowed her to post up and score inside.

“We hope she’s a force to be reckoned with next year,” Lecher said.

In addition to the individual marks on the Top 10, the team also set four new records.

The Swede girls tied the best field goal percentage in a game by hitting 66% against Minden in the SWC tournament semi-finals.

The team also made 307 free throws this season to improve the previous mark of 293 set in the 2001-02 season.

The overall free throw percentage of 65% is also a best-ever. The previous record was 62.7% set in 2001-02.

“We had several games that hinged on free throws,” the coach said. “There were times we couldn’t get a field goal to fall but we could make our free throws.”

Three games in particular—Ogallala, Cozad and Centura—came down to charity shots at the end of the game.

And finally, Gothenburg tied the fewest turnovers in a game record at six against Love Christian during the Cabela’s Holiday Shootout in Sidney.

Besides beating Minden in the SWC tournament, Lecher said getting to the district final game by winning the sub-district made a statement that Gothenburg girls basketball is back on the map.

“The girls came a long way this year and I think it’s safe to say that those coming back aren’t satisfied. They’re going to want more next year.”
