The Gothenburg girls were up against a tall and talented Class D-1 No. 2-ranked North Platte St. Patrick's Irish team last Thursday and lost 54-39.

Trailing by seven, 15-8, the Swedes traded baskets with the Irish for much of the second quarter.

Unfortunately Gothenburg committed eight fouls and the Irish capitalized at the free throw line shooting 11-14. That extended the lead to 14 after a running three pointer went in for O'Malley putting St. Pat's ahead 32-18.

Starting the second half Gothenburg hit a pair of baskets, forcing three turnovers on three Irish possessions.

Lecher said the girls played passing lanes and jumped some passes in the team's "buzz" defense, but converted back-door lay-ins to extend the Irish lead.



"We were being aggressive on the wings but we'd turn our heads and they would slip behind us," Lecher said. "After Christmas break we'll spend more time on defense and limiting turnovers."


The Swedes committed a season-high 26 turnovers in the loss.

Gothenburg closed the lead down to 10 heading into the final quarter of play after an Emily Franzen jumper closed the third quarter.

Trailing 42-32, the Swedes scored on three of their next four possessions shrinking the Irish lead to five, 42-37. Unfortunately, a four-and-a-half minute dry spell allowed St. Pat's to score eight unanswered points.

The Swedes' last basket came from Taylor Mroczek with 1:29 left in the game.
