

The Melon Juniors split four games over the past week, beating Lexington and Cozad.

A 9-1 win over Lexington opened the week before 6-3 and 8-3 losses to Holdrege and Ogallala, respectively. Coach Jake Fecht's squad got back on track on Sunday with a 7-5 win over Cozad.

Gothenburg will hope to carry momentum into next week. A mid-week road game against Shelton/Gibbon on Thursday will be the team's last chance to tune up before a match up at home with Minden on Monday.

Two-hitter stymies Lex

Lexington Pinnacle Bank's only hits on Tuesday evening came in its first and last at-bat of the game. The visitors got on the board in the first after the leadoff batter singled and later scored on a sacrifice fly to right field. It was the only run they scored off starting pitcher Riley Ostendorf, who pitched all five innings and picked up his third win of the summer.

The Melons took over in the second inning, scoring five runs on four hits. Tyler Teide had an RBI single and scored in the big inning, while Dominic Long plated two with a single and stole a base before scoring.

Ostendorf did not allow a hit between the second and fourth innings and struck out the side in the third. The pitcher expanded the lead in the bottom half of the third with a single that scored Blake Riley, his second RBI of the game.

Pinnacle Bank's first two batters reached in the fourth via an error and hit batter before a fielder's choice and two fly outs ended the threat. Ostendorf struck out the first two batters in the fifth and recorded his final out after a Daniel Kuefner was thrown out attempting to advance on a single.

The game ended in the bottom of the fifth when Brady Harrison scored on a passed ball. Both teams agreed to amend the regular mercy rule in an attempt to finish the game before weather threatened.



Harrison and Teide each ended the day 1-for-2 with a pair of runs scored.

Neither side threatened in the fourth, but the Holdrege bats heated up in the fifth. The visitors walked three consecutive times to open the inning before the Melons made a pitching change. Brant May relieved Dominic Long and inherited a bases-loaded jam. Holdrege used small ball to score three with a series of sacrifices.

The Melons got a run back in the bottom of the frame when May doubled and later scored. Long and Riley Ostendorf also reached in the inning, but Gothenburg failed to capitalize.

Quinn Haynes singled and stole second to open the third for the Melons. Ostendorf brought him home with a double. Another parade of singles from Haynes, Ostendorf and Kowalewski stretched the lead to 3-1 after three-and-a-half innings.

Ostendorf allowed his second hit of the game in the fourth inning but worked out of the threat without conceding a run. The same could not be said about the fifth, however.

With two outs and no one on, Cozad started an improbable rally, scoring four runs and taking a 5-3 lead. The Melons mustered up two hits in the bottom half but could not score.

Still trailing in the sixth, Gothenburg found some offense. Brundage opened the frame with a walk. Two errors and RBI singles from Ostendorf and Kowalewski fueled a four-run sixth, as the Melons reclaimed a two-run lead.
