

Third time is a charm for Wauneta-Palisade

WALLACE—The Brady girls got the best of Wauneta-Palisade twice this season.

The first game of the year was a four-point win for the Eagles and the opening round of the home holiday tournament ended in a easier 16-point victory.


But when all the cards were on the table and a trip to the Class D-2 state tournament was at stake, it was the Broncos who had the upper hand.

Wauneta-Palisade's girls defeated Brady 58-49 Friday night in the D2-5 district final at Wallace.

"You've got to hand it to Wa-Pa," said Brady coach Lance Arterburn. "They came prepared and they played hard."

After Brady senior Dakota Terry hit the first bucket of the game, Wauneta-Palisade scored on a break-away shot and then converted two consecutive Eagle turnovers into points in the first couple minutes of the game.

The Broncos kept pushing, using a stingy pressure defense to keep the Eagles out of their running game.



"We missed some key free throws that would have kept the score within reach," Arterburn said.

"We just came up a little short."

Brady was 5-of-10 from the line in the final period and 15-of-27 from the stripe for the game.

Terry led Brady in scoring with 14 points. She also pulled down nine rebounds.



Sophomore Josie Palmer contributed 11 points and seven rebounds.

Tailor Lee led the Broncos with 16 points while Fanning chipped in 11.

Brady finishes the season with a 20-4 record. It's the first time in school history the girls have completed three consecutive 20-win seasons.

"We are disappointed in the way it ended because we all had our hearts set on playing in Lincoln," Arterburn said. "But we can't be disappointed in what this team has accomplished."

Three senior players will graduate, having played on both the first-ever Brady girls team to make it to state in 2010 and the only team to advance, finishing fourth in 2011.

"The seniors have done a lot of great things to help turn this program around," the coach said. "They've set the tone for the future."

They'll be missed, Arterburn said, but the Eagles have plenty of fire power coming back.
