Brady's volleyball season came to end in the first round of the state championship last Thursday against eventual state runner-up Bruning-Davenport/Shickley.

In the second set however, the Eagles play lacked precision and it cost them the set and the momentum.


The Eagles lost the set 25-17 and that was all the Eagles of BDS needed for fuel.

"Those girls were the core of our serve receive and passing," Johnson said. "We are forced to rebuild that area for next year."

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Fortunately for Johnson, she returns a 6-1 freshman in Tara Callahan, along with Josie Palmer who has played in three state tournaments and Autumn Hild.

"Next year's team has two very good middles coming back with some younger kids coming up that will help make another run," Johnson said.

Autumn Hild will be a good all around player, Johnson added, but it will be a challenge replacing seven rotating seniors.

Next year's girls will have to mature more for us to make the best possible run, Johnson said.
